EVERY 15 minutes



Mingus Juniors and Seniors participated in the program 'Every 15 Minutes' coordinated by the Cottonwood Police and Fire Department. This is a nationwide program that provides teens with awareness about the dangers of distracted and drunk driving to hopefully prevent accidents. The name of the program "Every 15 Minutes" came from a statistic that every 15 minutes someone is killed in a drinking and driving accident. With awareness from programs like this one, that statistic has gone from every 15 minutes to every 39 minutes. This program first started in 1995 in California and has expanded across the United States providing a real-life experience without the real-life risks, so that teenagers can better understand the risks and hopefully prevent accidents.

The program is divided into two parts. During the first part, which took place on April 4th, students witnessed a mock accident staged by the Cottonwood Police and Fire Departments. The accident scene was narrated using speakers and microphones. After first responders removed the victims from the crash site and provided medical assistance, one of the 'victims' was loaded to a medical helicopter to give attendees a better understanding of the gravity of accidents such as this one. The second part of the program took place the next day, on April 5th, with the help of the Theater program. Students were able to witness a mock trial for the driver who 'caused the accident' and a funeral for two of the students involved who lost their lives.

"It was very impactful for our students to watch their peers suffer from the effects of poor decision making and the life changing impacts that came with it. The mock trial and funerals were a powerful display, stressing how the decisions to consume alcohol can affect many more people than just the one who drinks or texts while driving," stated Ms. Forbes, Dean of Students. Since the full production of this program can be a very emotional one, counselors were available assisting students and staff who were affected by the production.

Graduate Dress Code

Our graduation ceremony is an important community tradition and a final learning experience for our proud students; our dress code reflects this belief.

- **Men:** dress shirt, pants/slacks, clean shoes (dress shoes are preferred and ties are optional)
- **Ladies:** dress, skirt, or dress pants/slacks – be careful with heel height, it is a long walk, and we do not want you to take a fall on your special night!
- **No shorts, t-shirts, jeans, or flip-flops – no extremely informal attire**
- **No decoration on the graduation gown. No leis, boas, etc. – only school approved medals/cords are allowed.**
- **Graduation caps may be decorated, but the decoration must lay flat. No 3D or decorations hanging off the side. And decoration which would draw undue or negative attention is not permitted.**
- **Red gown, cap, tassel: the cap is to be worn flat on the head with the point at the center of the forehead and tassel on the right side. Red gown must be fully zipped for the ceremony.**

Senior Honors Night

We are extremely proud of the academic accomplishments of our seniors. We will hold a special ceremony on Monday, May 20th in the Mingus Union High School auditorium at 6:00 p.m. There will be a reception with light refreshments prior to the event at 5:30pm. If your student is being recognized for an award or scholarship, they will receive an invitation; however, all seniors and their families are welcome to attend. The attire for this evening is professional business attire.

Graduation Seating

Each graduate will receive four field tickets once all school fees have been paid. Tickets will be given to the graduates (not adults). Students need to pick up the tickets at the High School Office May 6th - May 17th. MUHS will not manage ticket issues related to family dynamics. Our hope is that four field tickets will allow for inclusion of all family structures. The north football gates will open at 5:00 pm, Friday, May 24th, for admission to the graduation ceremony. Seating in the bleacher area and the reserved on-field area (with ticket) is on a first come, first served basis, with no saving of seats. **CARPOOLING IS ENCOURAGED!**


Appropriate Behavior

If your child participates in a destructive or dangerous senior prank and/or demonstrates behavior that is not school appropriate, he or she will forfeit the privilege of participating in senior activities and/or walking at Graduation. If damage is caused to the school, no matter how little, law enforcement will be involved. Any behavior that draws attention away from the speakers, performers, or individual graduates being honored, or detracts from the dignity of the ceremony itself will result in removal from the ceremony.

We ask our proud parents to please respect all the graduates by remaining seated during the ceremony. Walking around on the field, engaging in conversations, or entering the student seating area for photographs is unfairly disruptive. Please do not enter the graduates' seating area. Blown up beach balls, poppers, silly string, bull horns, etc. are not appropriate. Graduation parties are more appropriate for celebrations of this nature.

Please discuss this issue with your graduate. We want to do everything possible to make this a cherished memory for all our students. A good rule of thumb, if the action takes away from the ceremony and focuses on an individual or group of individuals, then it is inappropriate and unacceptable. Thank you, in advance, for your understanding and cooperation.

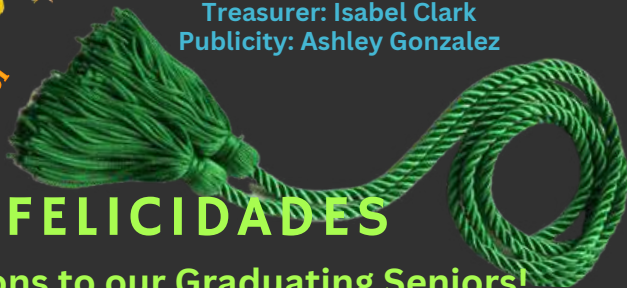
On May 6th, HHSS will celebrate Cinco de Mayo with piñatas during lunch.

They will be wearing Green cords at graduation to show that they have maintained a 3.0 or higher GPA, completed at least 10 hours of community service, and have been active members of the organization.



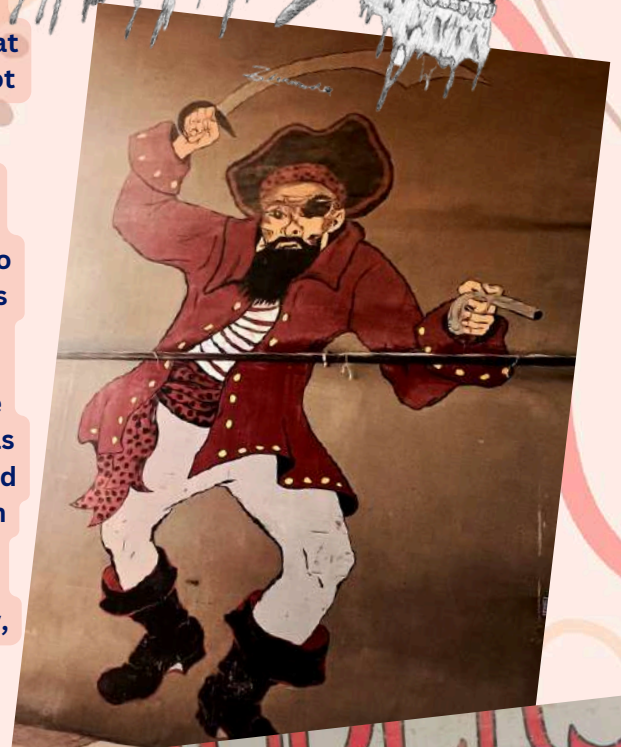
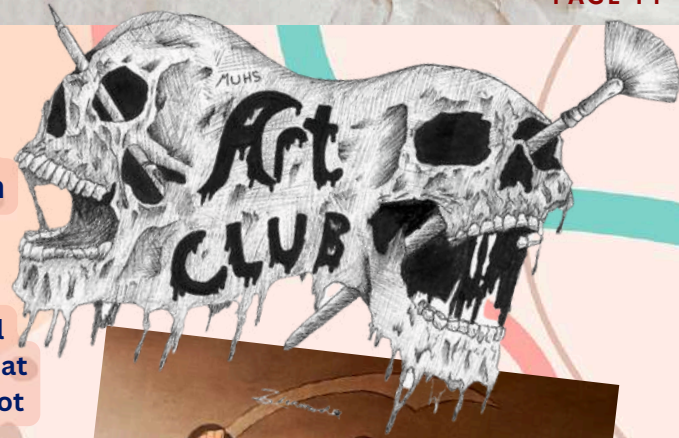


MUHS Art Club members took a field trip April 15th to explore the town of Jerome.

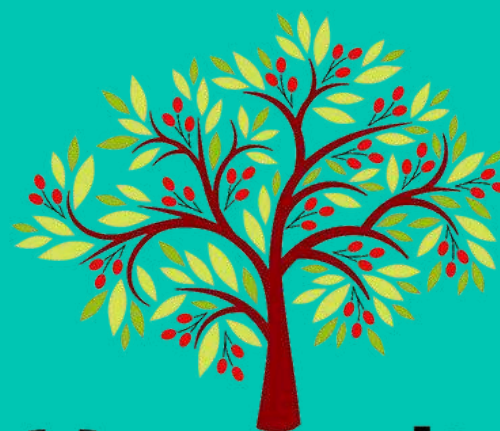
