

<u>Graduate Dress Code</u>

Our graduation ceremony is an important community tradition and a final learning experience for our proud students; our dress code reflects this belief.

- Men: dress shirt, pants/slacks, clean shoes (dress shoes are preferred and ties are optional)
- Ladies: dress, skirt, or dress pants/slacks – be careful with heel height, it is a long walk, and we do not want you to take a fall on your special night!
- No shorts, t-shirts, jeans, or flipflops – no extremely informal attire
- No decoration on the graduation gown. No leis, boas, etc. – only school approved medals/cords are allowed.
- Graduation caps may be decorated, but the decoration must lay flat. No 3D or decorations hanging off the side. And decoration which would draw undue or negative attention is not permitted.

- Red gown, cap, tassel: the cap is to be worn flat on the head with the point at the center of the forehead and tassel on the right side. Red gown must be fully zipped for the ceremony.

Senior Honors Night

We are extremely proud of the academic accomplishments of our seniors. We will hold a special ceremony on Monday, May 19th in the Mingus Union High School auditorium at 6:00 p.m. There will be a reception with light refreshments prior to the event at 5:30pm. If your student is being recognized for an award or scholarship, they will receive an invitation; however, all seniors and their families are welcome to attend. The attire for this evening is professional business attire.


Graduation Seating

Each graduate will receive four field tickets once all school fees have been paid. Tickets will be given to the graduates (not adults). Students need to pick up the tickets at the High School Office May 5th - May 16th. MUHS will not manage ticket issues related to family dynamics. Our hope is that four field tickets will allow for inclusion of all family structures. The north football gates will open at 5:00 pm, Friday, May 23rd, for admission to the graduation ceremony. Seating in the bleacher area and the reserved on-field area (with ticket) is on a first come, first served basis, with no saving of seats. CARPOOLING IS ENCOURAGED!

Appropriate Behavior

If your child participates in a destructive or dangerous senior prank and/or demonstrates behavior that is not school appropriate, he or she will forfeit the privilege of participating in senior activities and/or walking at Graduation. If damage is caused to the school, no matter how little, law enforcement will be involved. Any behavior that draws attention away from the speakers, performers, or individual graduates being honored, or detracts from the dignity of the ceremony itself will result in removal from the ceremony.

We ask our proud parents to please respect all the graduates by remaining seated during the ceremony. Walking around on the field, engaging in conversations, or entering the student seating area for photographs is unfairly disruptive. Please do not enter the graduates' seating area.
Blown up beach balls, poppers, silly string, bull horns, etc. are not appropriate. Graduation parties are more appropriate for celebrations of this nature. Please discuss this issue with your graduate. We want to do everything possible to make this a cherished memory for all our students. A good rule of thumb, if the action takes away from the ceremony and focuses on an individual or group of individuals, then it is inappropriate and unacceptable. Thank you, in advance, for your understanding and cooperation.

At the Academy she works with our students who are behind on credits She tutors, consults, motivates, redirects and cares about these students. Her favorite part of her job is seeing that hard work has paid off. She loves running into previous students and hearing about their success because of their mind change towards education that happened at the Academy. She also strives to help students see the purpose of finishing their education and help them set goals to make something of themselves. When engaging with a student who needs motivation she tells them to focus on small things so the challenge of all those credits does not look so big, Like, "You only have 1 credit of Math left". Or "When you focus, look how much you can accomplish" or "Lets see if you can finish this class by the end of the week." When it comes to her own motivation, several things keep her on task at work. One is the responsibility she has. As a paraprofessional, she is continuously searching for ways to help her students and other students focus on their education. She also enjoys constantly learning from and sharing experiences with her co-workers. Watching a student finally finish a class and watching them radiate from this accomplishment is what keeps bringing her back to work . Sherri has lived in Cottonwood most of her life. She is a Mingus Union Alumni and so are her husband and children. She was raised in a big extended family and loved the values that they taught her. She has four children and their wonderful spouses, and five grandchildren. In her free time she loves to bargain shop, do yard work, and hang out with her kids and grandkids. She also loves to play games around the table with her family.

Haley's favorite part of the job is always her students. She says that teenagers might be unpredictable at times, but that's what makes every day interesting. She enjoys helping them through their English work, seeing how they grow as writers and readers, and listening to their ideas, even when they're a little wild. Teaching seniors this year has been extra rewarding since I taught some of those students when they were in 9th grade. When she needs to find or maintain my motivation, she thinks about all of the impactful teachers she had as a kid (Mrs. Nelson, Mrs. Jackson, Mrs. Snider, Mr. Ostler, Mrs. Thorne, Mrs. Barton, and Mrs. Goldsmith to name a few). They too, pushed through

difficult days with minimal resources and support, and she still learned and grew with their support every single day. "If they could do it, so can I." When supporting a student who needs motivation, she would advise that they try to connect the skills they practice in the classroom to the real world. In the world outside of school, you might not be reading Shakespeare or delving into complex scientific concepts, but you will always need to persevere through difficult reading tasks, identify the source of an issue, collaborate, and solve problems. We practice all of that in school with the support and guidance of teachers, so take advantage of your time here!

Haley was born and raised in Sedona, and prior to teaching at Mingus, got her MFA in Creative Writing from NAU. She taught English and Creative Writing at NAU before coming back to the Verde Valley area in 2020. It was a huge career shift going from the college setting to high school, but she is very glad she did it. Who would have thought 9th grade English would be so fun! You can find Haley reading in her free time. Her goal this year is to read 100 books, and she is well on the way with 32 finished as of mid-April. She also loves spending time with her spouse, gardening, and enjoying the outdoors, whether that's at the creek or on the softball field with her team.



This course will introduce and train students in the basic to advanced skills necessary to pursue a career in construction. This course covers foundations, flooring, framing, plumbing, electrical, roofing, sheet rock, windows, doors, cabinetry, blue print reading, use of hand tools, surveying and construction math. Models to full-sized partitions are constructed in the shop. Projects at actual job sites are included. Upon completion of this course, students will have the opportunity to test for certification in Forklift Operations, OSHA-10, and Certification by the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER).

Students receive hands-on experience both in the classroom as well as on-the-job training while participating in business/industry internships. Many of our Construction students have been hired by local construction companies and are making competitive wages!
